

Dalmuir Parks History

Dalmuir Park is a special place with an inspirational history! Here are some quick historical facts:

- Dalmuir Park was opened in 1906 within the grounds of Dalmuir House. It was built by the people, for the people!
- The park has over 100 years of history and has been an important part of community since the 17th century.
- Dalmuir Park is the former site of the Richard Collins family estate, and the famous Paper Mill Factory.
- Dalmuir Park has survived the Clydebank Blitz of 1941, which decimated the surrounding area.

How can I find out more?

The most effective way to learn the history of Dalmuir Park is to join one of our Inspirational guided walks. These are fun and educational, and tailored towards family groups. Walks last roughly 90 minutes, but we will take you back more than 100 years ago! To register your interest please contact Sandra Anton (details are on the back page of this brochure).
