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Manager's Report



It was another busy and very important year for the Active Schools service as we tried to build on our successes of recent years and also build on the inspiration of the Glasgow 2014 Games and Ryder Cup at Gleneagles.

This year saw the continued success of our partnership with West College Scotland with 70 HND, HNC, Level 5 and Level 4 sport students being placed in primary schools to support and lead sport sessions at lunchtimes, during PE and after-school. A number of the students have now moved into paid coaching work with Active Schools and some have taken up opportunities for co-ordination and development work.

Developing young Sports Leaders is a key priority for Active Schools and we have had another very positive rise in the number of senior secondary school pupils who have volunteered to be trained and go onto support the delivery of sessions for younger pupils. September saw 25 girls attend Netball Leaders training and 20 attend the Dance Leaders training. Overall, 69 Sports Leaders were trained and involved in the delivery of sessions this year. That's a 13% increase on last year's total of 61 and an increase of 60% over the last 3 years which is fantastic.

Our links with local sports clubs were again strong, with 26 clubs being linked to schools via curriculum-time blocks, taster sessions and in-school promotion. 100% of schools had at least one school to club link—many had more.

One of the highlights of the year was to see our team of secondary school golfers win the Charlie Green Trophy, beating the team from East Dunbartonshire away at Kirkintilloch Golf Club.

March saw the introduction of our Active Schools Volunteer of the Month scheme, celebrated on our social media feeds. It has been fantastic to see how well received the posts have been - with thousands of people viewing them each month and many positive comments being added by members of the public. Volunteers of the Month receive a one month's all inclusive WDL membership and formal letter of thanks.

We introduced a number of other new schemes this year including a mini-movers festival for Primary 1 children in January for Clydebank primary schools at the Play Drome, through which we managed to recruit several volunteers to run 'Mini Movers' after-school clubs. In addition we developed a number of new community programmes in the Clydebank area including a multi-sport kids club; a Basketball club and a hugely successful Dodgeball club which saw some 60 children attend.

Overall it was another successful year in which we co-ordinated/supported some 5,000 activity sessions before school, at lunchtimes and after school, with almost 80,000 attendances by approximately 5,000 distinct children and young people. That's 40% of the school population. We still have work to do and will continue to work towards increasing opportunities and participation in 2015-16.


About Active Schools

The Active Schools Network is a team of people working within the school and the wider community in Scotland. Our goal is to offer all children and young people the motivation and opportunities to ‘get active’. This is achieved by ensuring there are more and higher quality opportunities for all children to participate in sport within schools and to increase capacity through the recruitment of a network of volunteers - who in turn deliver activity sessions in schools. In practice, this means increasing the number of opportunities for all children to get engaged in sport and also try to build bridges with sports clubs and other community organisations to give pupils a ‘pathway’ to continue their participation in sport and physical activity beyond the school gates.

Operating Environment & Structure

The Active Schools service is part of West Dunbartonshire Leisure trust but operates mainly within the Education environment, working closely with senior management in schools, particularly Head Teachers and Deputy Head Teachers in primary schools and Principle Teachers of PE in secondary schools. We take the lead in the planning, organisation, establishment and growth of sport and physical activity opportunities in schools and where appropriate, in local communities. The work of Active Schools contributes significantly to the Physical Education, Physical Activity and Sport experiences and outcomes under Health and Wellbeing of Curriculum for Excellence.

The Active Schools team in West Dunbartonshire is made up of an Active Schools Manager and seven Active Schools Co-ordinators (ASCs). The team work with all the primary and secondary schools across the region. Each co-ordinator is responsible for a group of schools, either within one or across two school learning communities, where these are large. Five of the team work with both primary and secondary schools, one co-ordinator works purely with primary schools and one work with primary schools and Kilpatrick school for pupils with additional support needs.



8 National Priorities for Active Schools

1. Recruit, retain and develop a network of volunteers, coaches, leaders and teachers who in turn deliver opportunities in school and community sport.

2. Increase the number of young people engaging in volunteering as sport leaders and coaches in both school and community settings.

3. Increase the quality and range of opportunities offered before school, after school and during lunchtimes.

4. Increase participation amongst under represented groups including girls and young women and children and young people with a disability.

5. Develop effective pathways between school and sports clubs to support the transition from school to community sport.

6. Motivate and inspire school aged children to participate in sport by delivering programmes designed to maximise engagement with London 2012, Glasgow 2014 and the Ryder Cup 2014.

7. Support the development and delivery of sportscotland led initiatives including Positive Coaching Scotland in line with national delivery plans.

8. Work in partnership with Education and Sports Development staff to develop an integrated approach across physical education, school sport and sport in the wider community.

Following on from the excellent 2012 summer, 2014 was another fantastic year with Glasgow hosting the 20th Commonwealth Games and Gleneagles hosting the Ryder Cup. Therefore it was imperative that Active School capitalised on the legacy of these fantastic events.

The Active Schools Handbook was created as a new working tool for the primary schools in the Clydebank area. This was well received by the schools as it set out all opportunities that Active Schools offer across the year.

Clydebank High School had an excellent and driven year with sports leadership. 25 pupils participated in the Y-Dance workshop with 9 going onto complete the Dance Leadership Level 1 Award.

These pupils then used their newly acquired skills and delivered dance sessions to pupils in the local primary schools. This enhanced their confidence as leaders and the younger pupils sporting experience in schools.

5 senior secondary pupils also completed the Netball Leaders Course and will use their skills to start up and lead a new netball club and team in Clydebank High. In addition, 2 Young Ambassadors attended the **sportscotland** conference and have been supporting the work of Active Schools in Clydebank High.

The tennis programme was semi-successful and it was aimed at pupils between P2 and P4. Each primary school was offered CPD in Tennis as were sports students of West College Scotland. Those trained then delivered a block of tennis within the curriculum. Along with this, the relationship with Drumchapel tennis club evolved and started to gather momentum, with the club being enthusiastic and supported curriculum delivery with taster sessions.

The Partnership with West College Scotland has continued with HNC and HND sport students being placed in primary schools, as work placements which they must complete as part of their course. In addition, the Level 4 and 5 sport students volunteered as assistant coaches. Working with the HND students they organised and delivered a successful P1 Mini-Movers festival which took place in January.

The local primary schools had an excellent year competing in inter-school competitions and events such as Cross Country, Netball, football, Tennis, Rugby, P1 Mini Movers, SHA and Golf.

As in 2013-14, students from SPTA took part in the World Marathon Challenge with great success. Teams from across the globe simultaneously raced against each other over the full marathon distance. A team of twenty S1 and S2 pupils completed the race in 2:23:23hrs and were placed 53rd in the 103 schools that took part across the world.

After a successful pilot of a Dodgeball community programme in the summer term, a new club was created at SPTA on Friday evenings. The Dodgeball has proved to be very popular, with 40-50 P3-P7 children regularly attending from across the Clydebank area.

A strong link has been established with Dance OFF! Academy – a successful, over-subscribed dance academy based on Kilbowie Road. The proprietor, Lesley Murray, is delivering a thriving Dance Club at St Mary's as well as a Mini Mover programme with two new parent volunteers. Dance OFF! Academy have further been involved with other schools across Clydebank, delivering dance during curriculum time and Health Weeks, and we are working together to further develop this partnership during 2015-2016.

Senior girls at SPTA accessed the day long YDance workshop, with 2 girls going on to complete the Level 1 Dance Leadership Award. After learning new choreography and leadership skills, they have delivered extra-curricular dance programmes within their cluster primary schools and wider community.

We have had another successful year in the delivery of the netball and football league; West College Scotland student placement scheme; Mini Tennis Academy; Mini Mover programme and the tennis, golf and rugby curriculum time programmes. In addition a broad range of extra-curricular provision was delivered across the cluster.

Our P5 ClubGolf competition was held at Dalmuir Golf Club, where we were able to use their brand new six hole, Par 3 course – a fantastic facility which will hopefully lead to a junior section of the club being developed.

St Eunan's Primary won the Clydebank Schools Football League and St Mary's Primary were crowned champions at our West Dunbartonshire Netball Finals.

Following an exciting summer of sport in Scotland with the Commonwealth Games and the Ryder Cup. We were keen to capitalise on the public's enthusiasm for sport and create a strong legacy programme within West Dunbartonshire.

At the start of the academic year, Head Teachers were provided the Active Schools Handbook for the area, detailing every curriculum programme, league schedule and festival information for all primary schools for the year. HTs really appreciated having all the information about the programmes etc. and it really highlighted the extensive and high quality provision that Active Schools offer.

2014-15 saw a 33% increase in extra-curricular activity sessions taking place before school, lunch time and after-school this year which has led to a 21% increase in the number of children taking part. This is a fantastic improvement and highlights the importance of teachers, school staff, parents and students giving up their time to volunteer and deliver clubs in school and how much children value it.

In response to HT requests for more activities for the infant age group we ran a P1 Mini-Movers Festival for all P1s at the Playdrome and invited parents along to participate. This was a great success and we managed to recruit a few new parent volunteers along the way.

In June a 4 week dodge ball club was piloted at St Peter the Apostle High, over 40 children attended and we are now looking at making this a regular club and how we can develop it further.

Community Clubs offer children who may not be engaged in club sport the opportunity to be active with their friends in a social and accessible environment. 2014-15 saw three new community clubs start in Clydebank. Following the success of the Faifley Kids club at Skypoint, the same format was replicated at Dalmuir Community Centre. Basketball was recognised as a popular sport in schools and so in November, we established a community basketball club at Clydebank High School. The club has proved popular and we are now working with Glasgow Fever Basketball Club to take the club to the next step.

Linnvale and Whitecrook pupils made it through to our West Dunbartonshire Netball Finals and the change of time from school day to the evening allowed 90-100 parents to come and watch their children and made the whole event much more exciting.

Following on from the success of the 2014 Commonwealth Games that were hosted in Glasgow, Active Schools were eager to use the enthusiasm and awareness generated to create a lasting sporting legacy in West Dunbartonshire.

Over the course of the year Dumbarton Academy cluster schools competed in a range of festivals including Netball, Golf, Tennis and Rugby. Aitkenbar Primary progressed to our West Dunbartonshire area finals for Golf and Tennis - and Braehead Primary progressed to the West Dunbartonshire Rugby final. Aitkenbar Primary and Dumbarton Academy pupils also attended the annual Active Schools Dance festival at the Playdrome.

This year also saw the introduction of the Dumbarton area Active Schools Primary Football Festivals. Over the course of the year we ran 3 festivals and between 6 and 8 schools took part in each of these fun festivals that took place at Dumbarton Academy.

Over the last 3 years there has been increased opportunities for senior pupils to complete Leadership Awards. This year saw 5 senior pupils complete the Netball Leaders Course, 8 completed the Dance Leadership Course and 2 pupils attended our Active Schools Sports Leadership Programme during the October holidays. Primary schools through-out the school year 2014-15. As a result of this a number of pupils from Dumbarton Academy delivered extra-curricular sports sessions both within the Academy and the local primary schools.

The strong club link developed with Loch Lomond Rugby Club continued to flourish in 2014-15. All four primary schools participated in a 4 week curriculum time coaching block for the Primary 4, 6 and 7 classes. Following the curriculum time blocks schools were invited to attend a Rugby Festival that was held at Loch Lomond Rugby Club. The Club also delivered curricular sessions and extra-curricular clubs at Dumbarton Academy which were well received.

The club link with Kirktonhill Tennis Club continued to grow this year through the introduction of the Dumbarton Area Tennis Academy - with Douglas their coach leading on the delivery of the sessions and the club hosting the sessions at their tennis courts. To encourage secondary school pupils to try out and take up tennis, the club provided curriculum-time sessions at Dumbarton Academy as part of their PE tennis block.

St. Patrick's Primary School in Dumbarton were supported to achieve a **sportsScotland Gold School Sport Award** in June 2015 – the first, and currently only, school in West Dunbartonshire to gain this award which was a fantastic achievement.

The school was externally assessed by **sportsScotland**, who recognised that the school places physical education and physical activity at the heart of the school. The award also recognises the number of extra-curricular clubs, links with local sports clubs and sporting competitions that the pupils of St. Patrick's are involved in, so the role of Active Schools within the school was vital to them gaining this award. The school was also short-listed as Team of the Year at the West Dunbartonshire Community Sports Awards 2015. It is hoped that this achievement will inspire many more schools in the OLSP cluster and the local authority to apply for the School Sport Award during 2015-16.

With the power of social media becoming increasingly evident, Active Schools and the OLSP cluster have embraced the use of Facebook and Twitter and reached out to a much bigger audience during 2014-15. This, in turn, increased awareness of the great work being carried out in the OLSP cluster schools on top of the coverage given through the local press.

This year saw a focus on increasing competition between the high schools in the area, with OLSP High School hosting several successful Girls Football tournaments attended by the majority of our secondary schools.

The partnership working between Active Schools and Kirktonhill Tennis Club went from strength to strength with our P2-5 Mini Tennis Academy being held at the club outdoor tennis courts during April – June 2015. Across the academic year 2014-15, 35 children attended, with several children also continuing the pathway by joining the junior section of Kirktonhill.

The Active Schools Dance Festival took place once again in June 2015. This was the 5th year of this annual show which is now established as one of WD Leisure's flagship events. 16 different dance groups, from schools and youth groups across the local authority performed including pupils from St. Patrick's, St. Peter's and St. Ronan's. It was a great show!

In comparison to 2013-14 [excluding St Kessog's], there has been a 4% increase on the number of activity sessions offered to pupils and the percentage of pupils participating increasing from 33% in 2013-14 to 40% in 2014-15.

Building upon the enthusiasm created by Glasgow 2014, we again linked with Loch Lomond Rugby Club to deliver curriculum based sessions within the Primary Schools for P4, 6 & 7 pupils. These sessions culminated in a rugby festival at the end of each session. These festivals were very well received and enjoyed by the pupils.

This year we have tried to diversify the after-school clubs that currently run. One example of this was provide Indoor Archery equipment to Renton Primary School. With the help of one of the teachers, an after-school archery club ran for two terms and was very well attended by pupils from P3-P7.

Continuing with this theme we also piloted an Orienteering Club within Gartocharn Primary School which again proved very popular with pupils from P4-P6 attending, this could only have run with the help of the enthusiastic volunteer parents.

The VOLA after school clubs were well supported by their sports council which was made up of senior pupils. Working in conjunction with the PE and school staff, afterschool clubs ran most days with a big increase in girls attending - e.g. the S4-6 Netball club which saw 20 girls attend on a regular basis throughout the year.

Through the developments in after-school clubs at VOLA managed to get establish teams for Netball & Basketball and competed against the other high schools in West Dunbartonshire. In partnership with the PE staff at VOLA, interviews were held for next year's Sports Council and from that 14 dedicated and enthusiastic pupils have been selected to lead on after-school clubs and school sport events.

5 senior secondary girls completed the Dance Leadership Award and supported dance sessions for other pupils. The Active Schools Dance Festival 2015 was held at the Play Drome in June and girls from VOLA were one of the groups participating and putting on a great show. They were joined by children from Haldane who attend Haldane Youth Services sessions.

A lot of these programmes would not have been possible if it wasn't for the hard work and dedication to sport shown by the Young Ambassadors & Sports Council in VOLA; school staff - both secondary and primary; and parents who gave up their time to help get more young people, more active, more often.

2014 was a big year for sport in Scotland with the Commonwealth Games being hosted in Glasgow. There was a great deal of excitement and enthusiasm prevalent in all schools on the back of the Games which was great.

With the support of Active Schools - Levenvale, Ladyton and Jamestown Primary schools were all successful with grant applications enabling paid coaches to deliver quality sessions in the schools, supported by volunteers. It is hoped that these keen volunteers will be able to use the knowledge and skills acquired last year to lead clubs in 2015/16.

Active Schools has continued to work closely with West College Scotland and the Student in Sport programme has developed over the years to provide a practical learning programme that has proven to be beneficial to both schools and students. Five schools had student coaches this year and this helped to boost participation figures in a range of sports.

Links with local community sports clubs have continued to strengthen and develop. The strong club link developed in previous years with Loch Lomond Rugby Club continued to flourish this year again.

All 7 primary schools participated in a 4 week curriculum-time coaching block for both the Primary 4 and Primary 7 classes. Following the curriculum time blocks, all schools were invited to attend a Rugby Festival that was held at Loch Lomond Rugby Club and was a success again. School to club links have also been strengthened with Funk Forever with Nadz Dance School, Christie Park Bowling Club, Levenvale Bowling Club and Vale of Leven Golf Club.

Christie Park and Levenvale primary schools have been supported to form strong links with local bowling clubs - Christie Park BC and Argyll BC - over the last year. Both clubs have struggled to attract young players to the sport in recent years and it is hoped that this initiative will help the club boost memberships in the junior sections of each club.

Over the course of the year, schools have competed in a range of festivals e.g. netball, golf, hockey and rugby. Jamestown Primary enjoyed plenty of success, winning the WDC ClubGolf competition and finishing 2nd at our West Dunbartonshire Netball finals.
