Spotlight of the Week: Clare English, Employability Leader



1. How long have you been in this role?

Worked with West Dun Council since 2013. Before this I worked for a charity for 5 years as well as with health clubs and hotels. I have a degree in sport, psychology and sociology.

2. What are the hardest and best parts of the job?

Hearing about people we support and what they've been through. Seeing how support has helped them e.g. helped move them out of poverty and into education.

3. When did you start Project Search?

2 years ago we started the Project SEARCH pilot. There are a few other Local Authorities working on the project and so we looked at the data in West Dun, took a visit to Renfrewshire to see how they ran the programme and decided this was something that was needed in the area.

4. What is your favourite part of Project Search?

Meeting everyone and the interview day. Hearing everyone's stories.

5. Was your career journey planned?

When I left school I did ok and went to work at Aggreko but while I was there I thought "I can't do this for the rest of my life". I decided to do an HNC at Anniesland and then went to University in Liverpool to study my degree at 23. Everyone has a different path.

6. How many people do you manage?

72 staff at W4U and I am responsible for 34

7. What is your favourite quote?

Fave quote – double, double, toil and trouble. My husband thought it was bubble bubble toil and trouble.

8. Do you prefer dogs or cats?

Dogs over cats. I have a dog called Holly.

9. What is your favourite restaurant?

My favourite restaurant is Eusebi Deli in Woodlands

My dream car would be a Volkswagen camper van

11. Where do you see yourself in 5 years?

In 5 years time I would like to be doing the same job as I would like to see how people progress.

Project Search collected for WD Foodbank



This Christmas, Project Search West Dunbartonshire partnered with the WD Foodbank to help those in need—and we achieved our goal! The foodbank has worked tirelessly for years to support the community. Claire Coyle, the manager, shared that she has been leading efforts for over 10 years alongside dedicated volunteers and core staff who operate five days a week, delivering a week's worth of food to those who need it. They don't stop at food—they also collect school clothing, toys, and toiletries. Claire noted that while support is strong during the festive season, additional donations are often needed in the spring and summer months

They also look for nappies to be donated and often face a shortfall in sizes 5, 6, and 7.

To help, Project Search had set up drop-off points at their Levensgrove Park facility and were grateful for all donations received. Items collected included canned food, cereals, rice and pasta, sauces, coffee and teas, sugar, as well as baby essentials like nappies and baby food jars. They also gathered toys for young children.
